Effective Conservation

Unlike many other conservation efforts, restoring bluebird populations offers direct personal participation and visible, rewarding results. Effective conservation is succeeding in restoring the three species of North American bluebirds: Eastern, Mountain, and Western.

The following are a few ways in which you can help the rebounding populations of bluebirds:

- Build or purchase NABS-approved nestboxes, placing them where they can be easily monitored and cleaned. Place the boxes on metal posts in areas of low or sparse ground cover with the entrance hole five feet or higher above the ground. Use proper predator control. Look for the NABS-Approved stickers on boxes found at retail stores. Sample nestbox plans are available on the NABS website.
- Create a "bluebird trail." A bluebird trail consists
 of five or more nestboxes spaced at least 100 yards
 apart and located where they can be easily and regularly
 checked. Tree Swallows and other native cavitynesting birds can also be attracted to a bluebird trail.
 Avoid establishing your trail in wooded or shrubbery
 areas, landscapes where pesticides are used, or
 where high populations of non-native House
 Sparrows exist.
- Request a guest appearance of a member from the NABS Speakers Bureau. NABS maintains the list of volunteers across the continent who are excited to share presentations about bluebirds and other native cavity-nesting birds. Better yet, make presentations yourself in your community. NABS has DVD's, videos, children's materials (K-7) and fact sheets for your presentations.
